Love One Another; John 13:34-35

- I. Love
  - a. We tend to have a one-sided view of love
    - i. Affection for each other
    - ii. Passion for your husband or wife
    - iii. A warm, fuzzy feeling when we talk, think about, or see someone
  - b. We use this word for many other things I "love" ice cream, golf, trucks, football, the Cubs, etc.
  - c. We need to come back to the idea of Biblical love
- II. Prove
  - a. To practice, express, or prove one's love
  - b. John 13:34–35 (ESV); <sup>34</sup> A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. <sup>35</sup> By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."
  - c. We often mistake love for a feeling, but the biblical understanding here is to offer proof of your love
  - d. We say the words "I love you" all the time they have to be followed up by action
    - i. The mark of a Christian is love love for our fellow Christians, love for the lost, love for our 'neighbor'
    - In Jesus' parable of the Samaritan that helped the Israelite who was beaten and left for dead we see love in action – love for someone who was not a friend, but a neighbor
    - iii. Right now our country is feeling the effects of a group of people who do not feel loved
    - iv. This group has singled themselves out by the color of their skin
    - v. In Jesus' parable the Israelite was singled out by his ethnicity, and the Samaritan also
    - vi. Jesus used the Israelites' enemy to prove a point, love overcomes hate Jesus asks the lawyer this enlightening question, "Which of these three, do you think, proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?"
    - vii. Love requires empathy, understanding and sharing the feelings of another
    - viii. We tend to want to prove our own lack of prejudice instead of our love
    - ix. "Darkness cannot drive out darkness: only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate: only love can do that." Martin Luther King Jr.
    - x. "Love is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend" Martin Luther King Jr.
  - e. We must prove our love to our fellow Christians and to the lost Jesus uses washing His disciples' feet to prove his point (love).
  - f. In life, love is a verb, not a noun
  - g. Loving one another is proving our love to each other
- III. Cherish
  - a. 1 Peter 4:8 (ESV); Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins.

- b. Cherish to protect and care for someone lovingly
- c. To keep or cultivate with care and affection: nurture<sup>1</sup>
  - i. We often save our cherishing, our nurturing for things other than people
  - ii. Pets "I'm not a people person, I have pets"
  - iii. That excuse won't fly with God
  - iv. We must become 'people persons' (people?)
  - v. Just as the Samaritan cared for and nurtured the Israelite, we must also
- d. Compassion is another form of cherishing, loving, caring
  - i. Matthew 9:35–38 (ESV); <sup>35</sup> And Jesus went throughout all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction. <sup>36</sup> When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. <sup>37</sup> Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; <sup>38</sup> therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."
  - ii. Jesus cherished the people He walked with, healing them and providing protection as a shepherd does his sheep
  - iii. Jesus cherished the people He walked with, sending out his disciples to proclaim the "Kingdom is at hand"
  - iv. Luke 22:42 (ESV); saying, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done."
  - v. Luke 23:34 (ESV); And Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." And they cast lots to divide his garments.
  - vi. Jesus, knowing that He was the only sacrifice that could forgive sin, put the needs of His creation, humanity, before His own wants
- e. Loving one another is cherishing, caring, nurturing each other
- IV. Attributes
  - a. 1 Corinthians 13:4–7 (ESV); <sup>4</sup> Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant <sup>5</sup> or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; <sup>6</sup> it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup> Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.
  - b. Patient to remain tranquil while waiting, have patience, wait; to bear up under provocation without complaint, be patient, forbearing<sup>2</sup>
  - c. Kind Loving and merciful
  - d. Does not envy to have intense negative feelings over another's achievements or success, be filled with jealousy, envy<sup>3</sup>
  - e. Or boast to heap praise on yourself

- f. Not Arrogant to have an exaggerated self-conception, puff up, make proud<sup>4</sup>
- g. Rude behave disgracefully, dishonorable, or indecently
- h. Does not insist to devote serious effort to getting your own way
- i. Not irritable to become angry
- j. Or resentful to keep score or track of someone's mistakes in order to punish them
- k. Wrongdoing versus truth
  - i. A lot of people today glory in sinful behavior instead of the truth of God's word
  - ii. Some people even glory or revel in other's mistakes
  - iii. God's truth is unchanging God's word is truth
  - iv. Love rejoices when other people get it right
- I. When we love one another we display these attributes
- V. Love One Another
  - a. 1 John 4:7–12 (ESV); <sup>7</sup> Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. <sup>8</sup> Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. <sup>9</sup> In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. <sup>10</sup> In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. <sup>11</sup> Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. <sup>12</sup> No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.
  - b. Prove our love to on another
  - c. Nurture and care for one another
  - d. Love one another
